HB09-1019	Requires the "owner" of a cat of age four months or more to ensure that the cat has a form of identification on or in "its" body.	No <sup>1</sup>		Yes	House 2nd reading laid over until June; deemed lost
HB09-1152	Increases the profitability of horse racing in Colorado by authorizing two new methods of conducting pari-mutuel wagering on horse races.	Yes <sup>2</sup>		No	Killed by the House Finance Committee
HB09-1172	Limits the number of unsterilized dogs over 6 months of age that a dog breeder may keep on premises licensed under the "Pet Animal Care and Facilities Act" (Act). Mandates annual certification by a licensed veterinarian that a dog is suitably healthy for breeding before the dog may be bred. Allows the commissioner to inspect at any time premises or records for the purpose of carrying out provisions of the Act. Makes denial or revocation of a license issued pursuant to the Act mandatory when the licensee or prospective licensee has been convicted of cruelty to animals. HB09-1294	Extends the state income tax checkoff program that benefits the nongame and endangered wildlife fund.		Yes	Yes	Signed into law
SB09-024	Makes several changes to laws governing how the Division of Wildlife (DOW) responds to landowners' claims of wildlife damage, including making it easier for a landowner to obtain a "kill permit" for wildlife. Provides an incentive for landowners to allow hunting on their property. An amendment added by the House Agriculture Committee would have mandated that the DOW issue kill permits when wildlife damage is "excessive." (This amendment was removed from the final version of the bill.)	Yes <sup>2</sup>	Excused	No	Signed into law
SB09-118	Re-authorizes the "Pet Animal Care and Facilities Act" (PACFA), a licensing and inspection program for various facilities that house or handle "pet" animals. Raises facility license fees by a sufficient amount to hire an additional PACFA inspector. Adds rats and gerbils to the definition of "pet" animal. Requires licensed facilities to publicly post the contact information for the department that enforces PACFA. Expands the PACFA advisory committee to include a representative from the dog daycare industry. Changes the next sunset review date for the act to 2014.	Excused <sup>2</sup>	Yes	Yes	Signed into law
